Awhile back, I asked you what you'd like to know about money matters and you sent in some great questions. This is the final question from that batch, but I'd love to answer more for you! Q: How old do you have to be to get a debit card?

At the time Emma wrote this question, she was age 10 but should be about 13 now. With a parent or guardian opening a joint teen checking account, Emma is likely able to get a debit card now at age 13, depending on her credit union's teen checking account structure. As a teen learns more about money management, these debit cards are likely to have spending limits, no fees, easy transfers and monitoring to help teens ease into independence. Practicing money management can help teach about the value of money and how to budget for financial goals.
