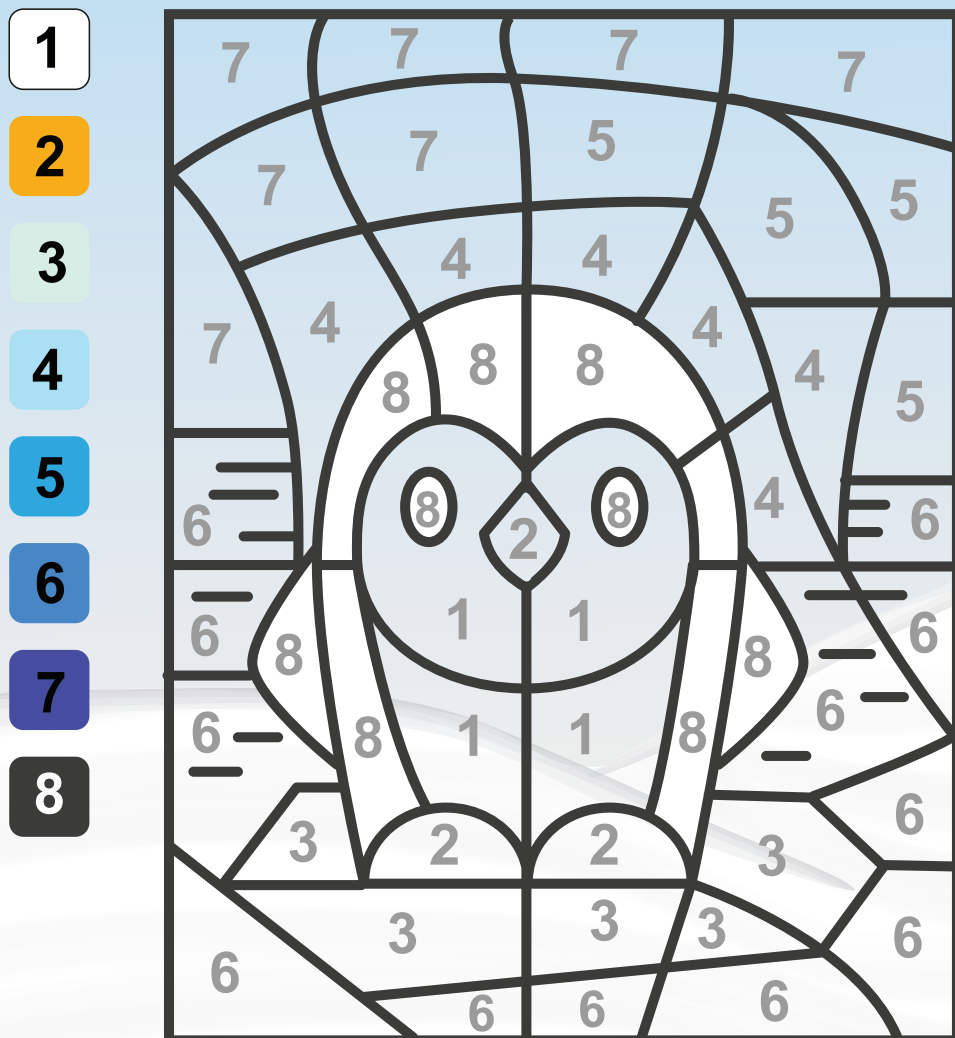
Q: Where is money made?

A: The Bureau of Engraving and Printing makes Federal Reserve notes (bills) at its facilities in Washington, D.C., and Fort Worth, Texas. The U.S. Mint makes coins at its four production facilities in Philadelphia, Denver, San Francisco, and West Point and uses a variety of machines and processes.
